


African heritage connects people in many different lands. This collection is a friendly introduction to some of these diverse and evolving cultures.

Concepts presented may not be unique to one nation nor ubiquitous in one place. Pronunciations may also vary widely from location to location.


A more detailed notes section located at the back of the book expands on each word as a starting point for further exploration.




# Awale is a strategy game played with stones in Ghana.




# Balafon is a musical instrument played in Mali.

#### NOTES

**AWALE** and similar variations such as Ayo, Oware, Mancala, and Warri are strategy board games. Two players compete by placing small stones into designated pits to represent planting of seeds. Each player attempts to sow (or collect) more stones than an opponent. Awale is one of the oldest known games still widely played today.

**BALAFON** is a musical instrument similar to a xylophone. It is made of wood and hollowed gourds, and played with mallets. While associated with Mali, it is also popular in Ghana, Burkina Faso, and Ivory Coast. In some cultures the balafon is considered a sacred instrument and used only in ritual events such as a marriage celebration or tribal festival.

**CHUKUDU** is a two-wheeled vehicle useful for hauling cargo. It is handmade by a specialized craftsperson with hard wood from eucalyptus trees. The driver propels a chukudu with one leg like a kick scooter. Invented during difficult economic times, chukudus are now celebrated as a testament to the resourcefulness of the Congolese people.


**DUKU** is one of many ornamental headscarves such as Gele (in Nigeria), Dhuku (in Zimbabwe), Doek (in Namibia), and Tukwi (in Botswana). They are colorful fashion accessories made of material that is firmer than regular cloth. Large and elaborate dukus are often worn for formal social occasions in Malawi.

**EVALA** is a traditional form of wrestling and a major spectator sport in Togo. Using strength and balance, each competitor attempts to push the opponent down from a standing position or out of a circular ring. Drawing international spectators, the greatest athletes are renowned for their cleverness and tenacity beyond brawn.
